## Recipe for Spring Show (Class 46)

### Butterfly Cakes (makes 18)

100g margarine  
100g caster sugar  
100g SR flour  
2 eggs

Heat oven to 190° C. Gas mark5  
Cream the margarine and sugar  
Beat in eggs one at a time adding a little flour with each  
Gently fold in remaining flour.  
Half fill paper cases with mixture and bake for about 15 mins until firm.  
When cool cut a slice from top of each cake and cut this in half.  
Place a little butter icing on each cake and arrange 'wings' on icing. Dust with little icing sugar.

### Recipes for Late Show (Classes 37 & 38)

#### Brownies

100 g SR flour  
100 g margarine  
2 eggs (beaten)  
50 g plain chocolate  
175 dark soft brown  
sugar  
Pinch salt  
1x2.5 ml vanilla essence

Heat oven to 180° C Gas mark 4  
Melt margarine and chocolate over hot water. Remove from heat and cool  
Stir in sugar and add eggs, mixed with vanilla essence  
Mix in flour and salt  
Pour mixture into 28 x 18 cm greased tin and bake for about 25-30 mins until top is crispy and inside soft.  
Leave in tin until cold before cutting into squares.

#### Quiche Lorraine

##### Pastry

100 g plain flour  
Pinch salt  
50 g margarine  
1 tbsp.Cold water to mix  
**Filling**  
100 g streaky bacon  
chopped  
75 g grated cheese  
2 eggs  
150 ml milk

Heat oven to 190°C Gas mark 5

##### Pastry

Mix flour and salt and rub in margarine  
Add water and mix into dough  
Roll out and line 18 cm flan dish

##### Filling

Fry bacon lightly then cool.  
Place half the cheese in pastry case and cover with bacon  
Beat eggs and milk together and pour over bacon & cheese. Sprinkle on remaining cheese.  
Bake for about 40 mins until set and golden brown.

**THE SOCIETY'S SHOW RULES**

1. All Exhibits are to be in accordance with the NCS, NDS, RHS, NVS, NGS & DS Classification where possible. Judging will be conducted under the appropriate current Code of Rules.
2. The decision of the Judges shall be final, and they are hereby empowered to withhold or diminish any prize if they consider the Exhibit to be of insufficient merit.
3. All specimens must be grown by, and have been the bone fide property of the Exhibitor, for at least three months previous to the Show.
4. Any person obtaining a prize fraudulently will be liable to forfeit all prizes to which he would otherwise be entitled. Any exchange or lending of exhibits will disqualify both exhibitors.
5. All matters in dispute to be settled by the Committee.
6. Any objection is to be made to the Secretary, in writing, with a deposit of 50p on the first day of the show.
7. Whilst every precaution will be taken by the Committee, they will not hold themselves responsible for the loss of, or damage to any exhibit.
8. No exhibit shall be moved before the end of the show.

Late Show—An exhibitor shall be considered a novice until he or she has won the appropriate Novice section and/or one 1st prize in the chrysanthemum section of the Late Show

11. **Daffodil Show** – All exhibits to be staged as cut blooms, no artificial supports allowed for blooms & all stems to touch water, except classes 32 – 34, & 36  
Only daffodil leaves to be used as foliage, except class 35 but foliage is not compulsory.  
The Daffodil Society's classified list will be used to define miniatures and restricted cultivars.

12. Vases provided by the society must be used in all classes except vase for effect classes

13. Chrysanthemum exhibits to be staged in accordance with NCS rules.

14. Exhibitors will be allowed to place their own blooms on the staging in the hall, but will not be allowed in the Hall during judging unless requested by Committee

15. Entries on the prescribed form will be accepted up to 30 minutes prior to the end of staging time.

16. Floral Art must be arranged in the hall.

17. Any entry in the craft section winning a first prize at the Society's show may not be entered in any future shows but may be exhibited for display purposes only.

18. An exhibitor is only allowed to enter a maximum of 2 entries in any championship classes

### Alpine & Rock Plants Show Rules

1. The definition of an 'alpine or rock plant' covers all plants, including conifers and shrubs, suitable for cultivation in a rock garden of moderate size, or in an unheated frame or alpine house. It excludes any plant, which will not survive an average British winter under such 'unheated' conditions, but does include many plants, which do not necessarily grow in mountainous regions.
2. Size of pots and pans. All pan sizes are measure externally and the term 'pan' shall be interpreted to mean pan or pot.
3. Number of plants in a pan. Unless otherwise stated only one species, one variety of a species, or one hybrid may be shown in a pan, but a pan may contain more than one specimen.
4. Unless otherwise stated a plant or plants need not have been grown in the container in which they are exhibited. If desired plants may be lifted and potted for the purpose of the competition.
5. All other society rules apply.
